Rector's Corner

Greetings, and Happy New Year!

Before the transition to the New Year, I began exploring what I believed most I needed to do to welcome in 2012 in a new and fresh way. What I found was insightful...but, not that surprising. Accordingly, I'd like to share with you what I now claim as my "New Year's Resolution" – to be more **gentle** in my life...in my personal life, in all the relationships I participate in, and in how I go about in my daily ministry here at St Simon Peter. But, before I go on, I find it important to define just what I mean by "being gentle," or "gentleness" in general.

Webster's dictionary defines gentle as "...free from harshness, sternness or violence." It is about being generous and kind in our approach to life and even to those we may differ with. Some of the attributes of being gentle might include being kindly and patient. Gentleness, therefore, is the state of being gentle – mild in both one's manner and disposition. In scripture, we are instructed to be gentle with both ourselves and with each other, "**Remind them to be subject to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready for every good work, to speak evil of no one, to avoid quarreling, to be gentle, and to show every courtesy to everyone.**" (Titus 3:1-2) Why? Because even our Savior, Christ Jesus, lived his life in gentleness and beacons to us to emulate His Way, "**Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.**" (Matt 11:29)

However, being gentler in our life covers a lot of ground...and can be applied to almost every facet of our daily routine. However, one area I'm convinced we all could be gentler in is how we communicate with each other...personally, professionally, socio-economically, and even spiritually. Listening with emphasis on gentleness depends a great deal on *perspective*: the position, context, or mitigating circumstances in which we hear and digest the information offered to us as we communicate with one another. Even those professionally trained "listeners," such as Spiritual Directors, admit to the difficulty of hearing a client's experiences or problems without coloring it somewhat by their own perspective. An associate of mine, Eric Law, has written extensively about the art of listening, especially in reference of being Christ's community together, and offers the following in how we might learn to listen within "God's grace margin":

In the grace margin, we invite [each other] to come together and share and listen to each other. In order to do that, we need to create an environment in which there is symmetry of authentic revelation, compassionate listening, and reciprocal exchange of power. Creating such an environment is not so easy....The first key to facilitating the grace margin needed is to ensure that the parties involved do not enter the dialogue with legalistic and political motives. Instead, we need to redirect the encounter to focus on relational issues...to learn from Jesus, who spent his time focusing on the needs of the people whom he encountered. (Inclusion: Making Room for Grace, 2000.)

For me, this reveals that I need to listen from a more empathetic perspective. That's how I have chosen to begin my journey into living more gently in my life.

How about you? What growth area(s) might you need to address in your own life dealings; or, in your own spiritual journey to become the person Christ may be leading you to be? I invite you to consider this deeply, and ponder what changes of heart and new beginnings Christ may be leading you toward.

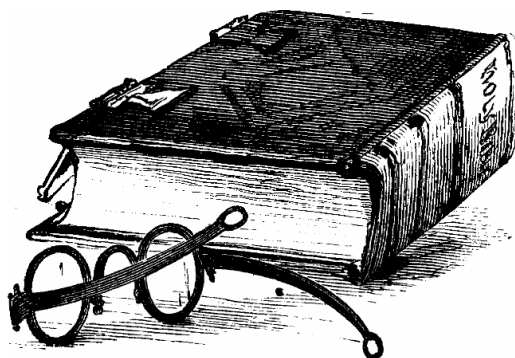

Their diligence, time and talent have seen this parish through a difficult year...and have worked hard to keep St Simon Peter a wonderful place to worship and serve. Well done, folks! Jay will continue as the Parish Treasurer...for which we are indebted to him for. We will install our new Vestry during our worship time on Sunday, 15 January.

Along with electing new Vestry members, the gathering also affirmed the following Lay Delegates for the 181st Diocesan Convention to be convened this February in Huntsville: Karla & Chris Conway, Josue' Almada and Worth Barham (alternate.) Congratulations to all! More info on the agenda and resolutions to be addressed during the convention will be shared electronically, as available.

Instructed Eucharist: For a while, many have asked about the proper way of receiving Holy Communion; or, have wondered why we celebrate the Holy Eucharist in the manner that we do. As the first of several efforts to answer your questions, we will offer an Instructed Eucharist – which provides insight into both when and why to the movements and orchestration of our Episcopal service – which also serves as the morning's sermon or homily. We are planning to offer this Instructed Eucharist on the 4th Sunday after the Epiphany, January 29th. Please come.

Parish Bulletin Boards: Through the Parish, there are Bulletin Boards which provide much information about parish- and diocesan-related functions and activities. The ones within the Parish Office hallway present information directed to each of you from both Carpenter House and the various ministries here at St Simon Peter. Foundation: St. Simon Peter Episcopal Church

Have you remembered St Simon Peter in your estate planning??

This very question was posed to the vestry in the early spring of 2011. St Simon Peter was in a sense very lucky to be the beneficiary of a significant bequest from the King family. At that time some of this money had been used to redo the sanctuary seating and floors, and correct some moisture issues. But your leadership realized we had no formal process to replenish the trust and plan for future expenditures from the trust. We believed St Simon could do more in outreach and the trust created an excellent springboard to achieve this endeavor. Therefore the vestry authorized me to investigate putting together a process for planned giving to the church.

An ad hoc committee consisting of Worth Barham, Liz Parsons, Karla Conway, John Rickards, and Wayne Wilcox was assembled with the idea of determining the feasibility and structure of planned giving for our church. Members of the committee brought excellent credentials including; legal expertise, fund raising expertise, endowment management expertise, and planned giving expertise. We worked diligently using ideas from our own background, the Episcopal Foundation of the National church, and the Presbyterian Children's Home to craft a FOUNDATION tailored to St Simon Peter Episcopal Church.

We wanted a way to encourage parishioners to give and we wanted to make giving a gift as easy as possible. But the real fruit of the labor was to develop a way to distribute funds from the foundation that would be impactful and make a lasting difference.

A resolution was adopted by the vestry in November 2011 establishing the St Simon Peter Foundation Fund. In part the resolution stated : WHEREAS, Christian stewardship involves the faithful management of all of God's gifts-time, talent, the created world, and money, including accumulated, inherited and appreciated assets; ... that the purpose of the FUND is to enable the PARISH to fulfill its mission more completely by developing its ministries beyond what is possible through its annual operating fund. Distribution from the FUND shall be limited to Mission for local and global ministries, including mission trips; Christian education; Worship and music ministries; And donor directed gifts. The resolution also established the FOUNDATION FUND COMMITTEE which shall have oversight responsibility for the fund.

A striking pamphlet summarizing the main points of the Foundation was created by Karla and is available at several locations throughout the church and parish hall. Please feel free to take one. The entire resolution can be found on the parish bulletin board in the hallway between the Rector's office and the parish hall.

If you have any interest in long term giving to the church or would like to ask questions about the foundation I encourage you to contact any one of the members on the Foundation Fund Committee. Worth Barham, Liz Parsons, Karla Conway and John Rickards. It is my hope that everyone in the Parish will become a benefactor.

Tornado Relief Update, Dec 2011

Thank you to all who have contributed to the Shoal Creek Disaster Relief effort, either through donations or by lending a hand in the work we are doing and will continue to do.

I have been blessed to be your eyes and ears on the ground in this effort and it has been a very rewarding experience for me. Thank you for putting your trust in me.

Over the past several months there have been many trips to the Shoal Creek Valley and to Birmingham to attend meetings. These were necessary to determine the needs of the residents and establish ways in which we could help those who have suffered through this disaster.

The Baptist Association (Dr. Ben Chandler) was very helpful and encouraged me through most of this period of time, as well as the United Way of Birmingham and FEMA. Currently, many of the funded projects are being turned over to the Birmingham Habitat for Humanity Affiliate for supervision of the construction. In meetings with Birmingham Habitat, they are most grateful for local assistance and I will try to help them out as I am able, with your support. I expect that this effort will carry on well into 2012 and maybe even beyond.

Some of the things we (collectively) have done are: build a deck and wheelchair ramp for the Alverson family (see pictures on the bulletin board) helped put up drywall at the Hansen home, with the help of a crew from Grace Church in Camden South Carolina, installed insulation and wall board at the Lang's home, installed insulation in the Smith house as well as clean up there, and recently, we provided material for and built a deck and wheelchair ramp for the Dickinson Family.

In addition, volunteers from our church assisted in conducting a survey of needs along the Shoal Creek Road, which has resulted in a database being prepared to better manage the recovery effort.

And, of course, you very generously provided Christmas for three families in the Shoal Creek Valley. I have spoken with each of these families and I can tell you that they are all very thankful for everything they have received.

We have received financial support from the Diocese of Alabama and have been informed that there will be additional help in 2012. Grace Church in Camden, SC sent a crew here in Nov, and we expect another youth group from Needham, Mass to be here in April to also help out.

Over the next few months, I will try to identify projects which we as a church can work on. One of the greatest needs is for people to do the work. Shoal Creek is a rural area and there is not a ready supply of labor, so when we go to build a deck for example, it is important that we are able to bring workers with us. We have had good support from local businesses (Home Depot in particular) offering discounts.

My thanks to Bruce Bower, Josue Almada, Shawn Knepper, my friends Tiger Covey, Steve Hansen and Cary DeMotte and especially Wayne Wilcox for all your efforts in spending time and effort helping the folks in Shoal Creek.

This representation is located on Highland Avenue, across from the old Highland Park Club and Golf Course. Miriam's family was involved in the development of this part of Birmingham and her grandparents lived in one of the homes above the "stairs." The picture has the typical stations imagery, but also cars on the road, a boy on a bicycle, and the golf course in the background. Special Holiday Story

It has been a mad rush to get Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year comings and goings. Food to take every time you leave the house. Waking in the morning and trying to remember where I had to go. The same every year, Except this year.

When I volunteered to help in Shoal Creek , I had no idea where this was taking me. While knocking on doors and trying to get a feel of where people were after the tornados. Helping to find out who needed the help and where to help. I knocked on the door of the fire chief in Shoal Creek. His wife invited us in and showed us pictures and talked about how her husband had landed in the river in the fire truck. She told me how she was trying to get thinks finalized for some people who slipped thru the cracks. I mentioned if she found that some needed help for Christmas , I could get my Church to help. I left her my number not thinking I would hear from her, but 2 days later she called. She gave me names of neighbors who had lost everything, did not have insurance to cover, or spent what they had on repairs and medical expenses.

The tornados that went thru that valley over 6 months ago was a life changing experience for many. Many told me their story and would point to a tree that was held up by another narrowly missing the bedroom where the children slept. They pointed out where trees had once stood, where things wrapped around trees that were still standing. Where this house or that house once stood. How after 6 months what they had accomplished or what they had not. How a tree had come thru the roof right where “we would have been except for.....” How a riding lawn mower wound up down the road wadded up in a ball. And one statement brought it all home for me saying “I’ve walked this valley and have never found even a chip of my china.” I cannot even imagine everything just disappearing.

But I did not hear one angry voice only thanks to a God who could move mountains. I heard “Help my neighbor he lost so much.” This was a humbling experience for me.

And when asked what help they needed they would say they only wanted a Christmas tree This year I saw Christ everywhere I looked. As Our Church accepted the challenge to give to people who had lost everything I felt each wrapped present to my soul. When I had initially started this with my only thought was if that happened to my children I would want someone to help them. But after personally getting to know these families and crying and laughing together it is so much more.

I wanted everyone at St. Simon Peter to know what they have done. You have touched lives. You made a difference. So when you wake on Christmas morning, think about these 3 families who will have something under their tree to start a new life and that as a community we have helped.

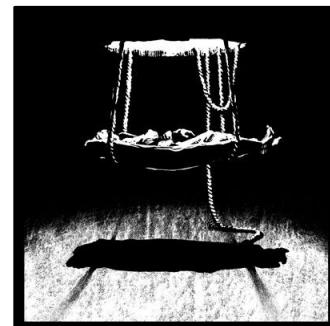

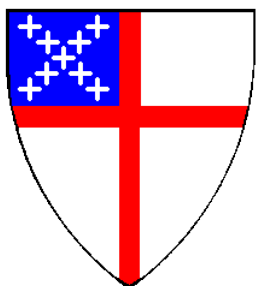
